Frank Stodolka has reported that "I-7" is running into money difficulties. Stodolka said that about \$100 would be needed to get the movie rolling, with an additional hundred bucks necessary afterward for developing and editing expenses.

However, if the money isn't raised, the group isn't going to despair. A radio-play version of the script will be done; there is the possibility that this may be aired semi-commercially over the air. All proceeds from this would be put into the money fund for the motion picture production.

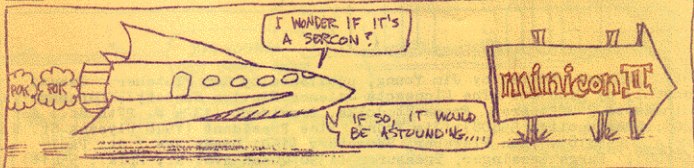
Incidentally, a studio has been procured for the filming. It's at the Arts and Science building // on the St. Paul U of M campus--R.F.//; some special-effects equipment is available there. "I-7" may not appear as a film at Minicon II; but it will appear (at the least) as a radio-play.

**MAGAZINE NEWS:** Robert A.W. Lowdes has started up another fiction magazine; this one is a western fiction journal, bearing the name **THRILLING WESTERN MAGAZINE**. This is the fifth fiction addition to the Health-Knowledge chain (which also publishes **MAGAZINE OF HORROR**, **FANCY SCIENCE FICTION** and **STARTLING MYSTERY**, all of which feature SF or fantasy.)

Barry Malzberg is leaving **AMAZING** and **FANTASTIC**. No new editor has been announced yet. Malzberg succeeded Harry Harrison at the editorial chair of **AMAZING**.

**SF TIMES**, another worthy SF newszine, states that William Crawford is either going to revive **SPACEWAY** or start up something called **SPECTRUM SCIENCEFICTION**, or do both. Crawford was the man who started and controlled one of the first of the SF specialty book-houses, **FANTASY PUBLISHING CO., INC.** He has stories ready by Van Vogt, Ted Tubb, Earl Vincent, Ralph Milne Farley (evidently a novel which is part of Farley's "Radio" series which started in **ARGOSY** in 1924), and Jeff Sutton. Publishing is supposed to begin by the end of the year.

**BALLANTINE BOOKS BOUGHT BY INTERT**

Ballantine Books Co. was bought by the International Textbook Co. (Intert). Ian Ballantine will remain president of the paperback firm, and the editorial offices of the division will remain the same. The main difference between the former Ballantine Co. and the new Ballantine division is that Ballantine will have more money behind them. (As an example, come February, Ballantine's SF schedule will increase to fifteen titles per month. That surpasses the number published during the SF boom in the fifties!) Along with this expansion, a "special promotion" is to be put behind certain titles, with a special promotion behind an SF book alone, per month!

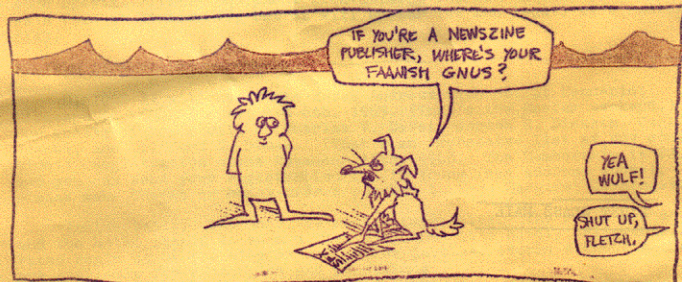

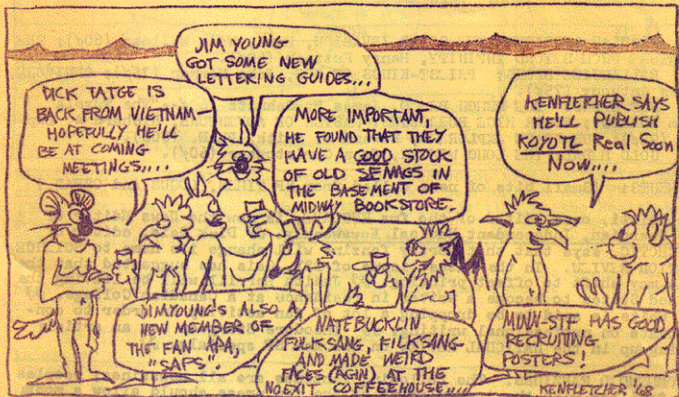
