2012: Year of the Family

At a meeting of priors of the District of Asia last November, the District Superior, Fr. Daniel Couture, amid deafening applause, decided to make the year of grace 2012 a time for promoting the ideals of Catholic family life. The family is not only the most important institution for the preparation of individual souls for heaven, it is also the building block of society. But now, as never before, the family is an institution under attack and is suffering as a consequence.

Modern Problems

A few years ago (2006), a book was published by a Mrs. Sue Palmer with the title *Toxic Childhood: How the Modern World is Damaging Our Children and What We Can Do About It.* (ISBN 0752873598) In the book, as the title suggests, the authoress attempts to expose in a systematic way the tragedy caused by our modern society in relation to children. She elaborates upon the harmful effects

- of poor diet on mental and physical development;
- of too few hours of sleep on health and learning;
- of electronic media (television, computer games, mobile phones, internet [and now social media]) on the development of cognitive processes and social skills;
- of the absence of the mother from home;
- of buggies that face forwards instead of backwards towards the mother (because the mother should be her child's prism through which the world is observed);
- of consumerism and advertising;
- of lack of conversation, communal meals and family activities;

of the cataclysm of divorce.

....among other things.

Inadequate Modern Solutions

The book is interesting for the cataloque of woes it lays out, but it fails both in identifying government legislation and practice as a primary cause of damage to the family (tax & benefits regimes, promotion of sex education in schools, feminism, homosexuality, family planning, abortion etc.) and it falls short in the solutions it offers. Yes, we should obviously think about avoiding junk food, going to bed early, getting rid of the television, spending quality time with the children etc.. The book gives many superficial material solutions to modern ills, but it fails entirely in rooting those solutions in anything more substantial than a vague notion of what seems to be good, (ie. what seems to be natural) and what is imagined to be feasible.

For the Catholic or truly natural reader (they are one and the same thing), what is missing in the book is any notion of the existence of God and of the order inscribed by God in human nature (and hence in the family). There is no notion of objective right and wrong consequent to our nature and our relation to God, and there is no notion of love by which a soul sacrifices itself to strive for its perfection on earth.

One might say in defence that it was not a religious book and so would not have arrived at these conclusions as a consequence, but the existence of God, objective right and wrong and true love are not specifically religious notions; they are entirely natural.

The Only Solution

As Catholics, we know by faith that there is another element in the equation of human perfection. It is this: the perfec-

tion of the natural order, which includes the perfection of the family, is impossible without *grace*. For a family to be truly functional, it must be truly religious. It must take the Holy Family as its model and must aspire to supernatural virtue through, not only material means (eating and sleeping well, shutting out the evil influences of the world, etc.), but especially by frequentation of the sacraments, prayer in common (the family rosary) and a practice of virtue.

May your families grow in grace and virtue throughout this new year. May fathers be both daring and prudent in their governance of their families, may mothers be a glowing hearth of charity at their centre, may children honour and obey. Please remember our mission in your prayers. Thank you for all you have done for us. The pictures you see give only a keyhole view of the good that you do.
