Key Senate Votes

Nuclear Weapons

1. 2004 Defense Authorization/Low-Yield Nuclear Weapons

Allard, R-CO, motion to table (kill) Feinstein, D-CA, amendment that would strike from the bill a provision allowing the resumption of research and development on low-yield nuclear weapons. Motion agreed to 51-43: R 48-1; D 3-41; I 0-1. May 20, 2003. Vote #186. **A vote no is a (+).**

2. 2004 Defense Authorization/Low-Yield Nuclear Weapons

Warner, R-VA, amendment to the Reed, D-RI, amendment. The Warner amendment would allow work on low-yield nuclear weapons to proceed beyond the research phase only with explicit approval from Congress. The Reed amendment would ban all work on such weapons beyond the research phase. Adopted 59-38: R 50-1; D 9-36; I 0-1. May 21, 2003. Vote #187. **A vote no is a (+).**

3. 2004 Defense Authorization/Nuclear Earth Penetrator

Warner, R-VA, motion to table (kill) the Dorgan, D-ND, amendment that would prohibit the use of funds for the study, development, testing and engineering of nuclear earth penetrator weapons. Motion agreed to 56-41: R 50-1; D 6-39; I 0-1. May 21, 2003. Vote #189. **A vote no is a (+).**

4. 2004 Energy and Water Appropriations/Nuclear Weapons Funding

Domenici, R-NM, motion to table (kill) the Feinstein, D-CA,

amendment that would prohibit the use of \$21 million for Energy Department activities related to the Robust Nuclear Earth Penetrator, the Advanced Weapons Concepts, including low-yield nuclear weapons, and for certain modifications of the readiness posture of the Nevada Test Site and for site selection of the Modern Pit Facility. It would reallocate those funds to reduction of the public debt. Motion agreed to 53-41: R 48-1; D 5-39; I 0-1. Sept. 16, 2003. Vote #349. **A vote no is a (+).**

International Cooperation

5. 2004 Defense Appropriations/Iraq War Costs

Cochran, R-MS, motion to table (kill) the Boxer, D-CA, amendment that would require the Defense secretary to submit a report to the House International Relations Committee and the Senate Foreign Relations Committee every 30 days detailing the costs of military action and the number of US personnel serving in Iraq, including any contributions from foreign countries. Motion agreed to 50-45: R 50-0; D 0-44 ; I 0-1. July 16, 2003. Vote #281. **A vote no is a (+).**

6. 2004 Defense Appropriations/Cost of Iraq Operations

Stevens, R-AK, motion to table (kill) the Dorgan, D-ND, amendment that would require the president to submit to Congress a cost estimate for fiscal 2004 military operations in Iraq and Afghanistan not covered by the underlying bill.

Motion agreed to 53-41: R 50-0; D 3-40; I 0-1. July 16, 2003. Vote #278. **A vote no is a (+).**

7. 2004 Defense Appropriations/Iraqi Reconstruction

Stevens, R-AK, motion to table (kill) the Kennedy, D-MA, amendment that would require the president to submit a report to Congress on a strategy for Iraqi reconstruction, including plans for security and humanitarian assistance. The report would have to include schedules for seeking NATO participation and for seeking approval of a multilateral force from the UN Security Council. It would also have to include estimates for the number of troops needed in Iraq. Motion agreed to 52-43: R 50-0; D 2-42; I 0-1. July 16, 2003. Vote #283. **A vote no is a (+).**

8. 2004 Supplemental for Iraq and Afghanistan/ Intelligence Commission

Stevens, R-AK, motion to table (kill) the Corzine, D-NJ, amendment that would establish a 12-member independent, bipartisan commission to examine and report on the role of policymakers in the development and use of intelligence related to Iraq and Operation Iraqi Freedom. The commission would be required to submit a report to the president and Congress within nine months of its first meeting on its findings and recommendations. The amendment would authorize \$5 million for the commission. Motion agreed 67-32: R 51-0; D 16-31; I 0-1. Oct. 17, 2003. Vote #395. **A vote no is a (+).**

Human Rights & Democracy

9. 2004 Defense Appropriations/Military Detainees

Stevens, R-AL, motion to table (kill) the Bingaman, D-NM, amendment that would require the Defense Department to submit a report within 90 days on individuals detained as military combatants, including the names and nationalities of all detainees and information on how the government plans to handle each detainee's case. Motion agreed to 52-42: R 50-0; D 2-41; I 0-1. July 16, 2003. Vote # 279. **A vote no is a (+).**

10. 2004 Supplemental for Iraq and Afghanistan/ Stock Options.

Stevens, R-AK, motion to table (kill) the Lautenberg, D-NJ amendment that would prohibit the use of Iraq reconstruction funds for any contract or financial agreement with an entity that pays deferred compensation to the president, vice president, or a Cabinet-level official, or any entity in which the president, vice president or Cabinet-level official holds options to purchase more than 1,000 shares of stock. It would be effective 90 days after the bill's enactment. Motion agreed to 65-34: R 51-0; D 13-34; I 1-0. Oct. 16, 2003 Vote # 386. **A vote no is a (+).**

Nuclear Weapons

1. 2004 Defense Authorization/Nuclear Weapons Research

Tauscher, D-CA, amendment that would transfer \$21 million to study the feasibility of developing new nuclear weapons, including an earth penetrating weapon, to conventional weapons research programs. Rejected: 199-226: R 8-213; D 190-13; I 1-0. May 22, 2003. Vote # 216. **A vote yes is a (+).**

International Cooperation

2. 2004 Supplemental for Iraq and Afghanistan/ Transfer Authority

Markey, D-MA, amendment that would strike various provisions of the bill allowing the president and the Defense secretary to transfer money between accounts at their discretion. Rejected 146-279: R 2-222; D 143-57; I 1-0. Oct. 16, 2003 Vote #550. **A vote yes is a (+).**

3. 2004 Supplemental for Iraq and Afghanistan/ Military Construction

Loretta Sanchez, D-CA, amendment that would strike language in the bill that would authorize the use of funds for unforeseen military construction projects in support of the global war on terrorism. The result would be to limit the authorization to projects in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Rejected 128-295: R 5-218; D 122-77; I 1-0. Oct. 16, 2003 Vote #552. **A vote yes is a (+).**

4. 2004 Intelligence Authorization/Intelligence Sharing with UN Inspectors

Lee, D-CA, amendment that would require a study on how much intelligence the Pentagon and the intelligence community shared with UN inspectors searching for weapons of mass destruction in Iraq before the war. Rejected: 185-239: R 1-223; D 183-16; I 1-0. June 26, 2003. Vote # 320. **A vote yes is a (+).**

5. State Department Authorization/Ban on UN Contributions

Paul, R-TX, amendment that would block any funds authorized in the bill to be used to pay the US contributions to the United Nations. Rejected 74-350; R 72-150; D 2-199; I 0-1. July 15, 2003 Vote #364. **A vote no is a (+).**

6. State Department Authorization/Cap on UN Contributions

King, R-IA, amendment that would cap the US contribution to the UN regular budget to no more than the amount paid by any other permanent member of the Security Council. Rejected 187-237: R 173-50; D 14-186; I 0-1. July 15, 2003 Vote # 365. **A vote no is a (+).**

7. 2004 Supplemental for Iraq and Afghanistan/ Competitive Bidding

Sherman, D-CA, amendment that would require normal competitive bidding procedures for all government contracts relating to Iraq's oil infrastructure. Adopted 248-179: R 47-179; D 200-0; I 1-0.

Oct. 17, 2003 Vote #557. **A vote yes is a (+).**

Human Rights & Democracy

8. 2003 War Supplemental/ Counter-Drug Activity

McGovern, D-MA, (with Skelton and DeLauro) amendment that would increase funding for the Office for Domestic Preparedness by \$34 million and decrease funding for counter-drug activities in Colombia by \$61 million. Rejected 209-216: R 18-206; D 190-10; I 1-0. April 3, 2003. Vote # 106. **A vote yes is a (+).**

9. 2004 Foreign Operations Appropriations/ HIV/AIDS and Colombian Military

McGovern, D-MA, amendment that would increase by \$75 million funding for HIV/AIDS programs and offset the cost with a reduction in funding for the US counterdrug activities in Colombia and in foreign military financing programs. Rejected 195-226: R 12-209; D 182-17; I 1-0, July 23, 2003. Vote # 426. **A vote yes is a (+).**
