The Man Behind

Elk Fountain



Between the two Plaza Blocks, Main Street curves around a huge elk fountain given to the city by former Portland mayor and civic leader, David P. Thompson.

Thompson served in the Oregon State Legislature and was twice elected Mayor of Portland, once in 1879 and again in 1881.

Roland Hinton Perry, whose work adorns the Library of Congress and the dome of the Pennsylvania state capitol, created the bronze statue to commemorate elk that once grazed nearby.

Many have tried to have Thompson's elk removed because it can be considered a traffic obstacle, but the elk statue remains. In 1974, Thompson's elk and the Plaza Blocks were designated as Historic Landmarks.

Contest Rules

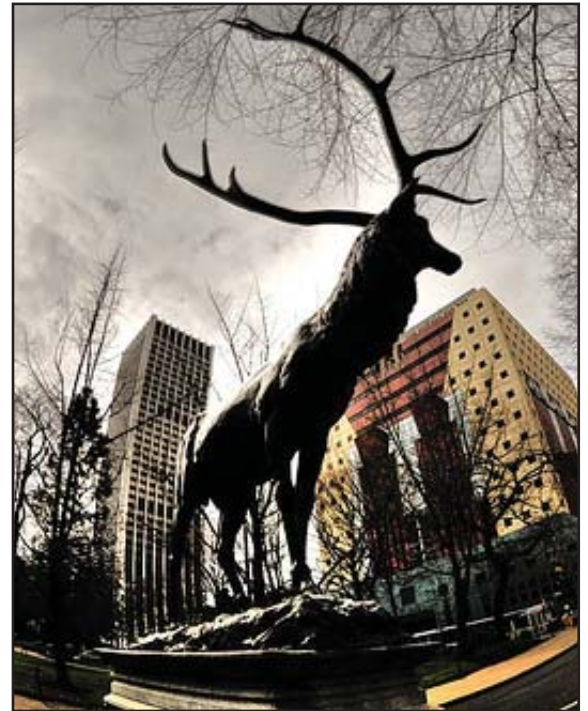

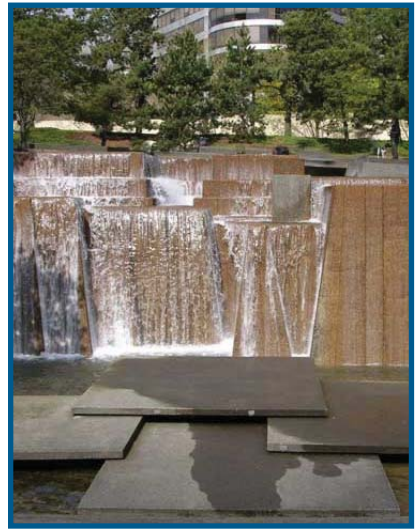

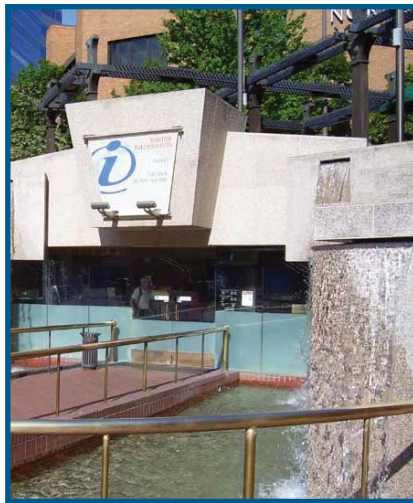

Keeping Portland's decorative fountains maintained in good working order is no small task. It's actually a *lot* of tasks.

Operating Engineer **John Bee** is assigned to fountain maintenance and operations. He cleans them. He grabs water samples and takes them to the BES lab to test for coliforms in the water. He empties the fountain pools, refills them, and rechlorinates them whenever needed.

Most decorative fountains operate spring through fall from 6:30 am to 8 pm. The next time you find yourself looking fondly at one of them, thank our very own Fountain Man, John Bee.

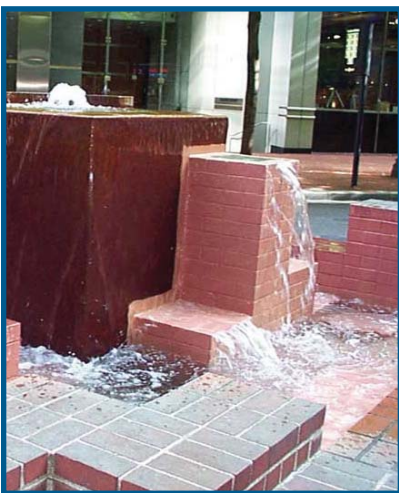

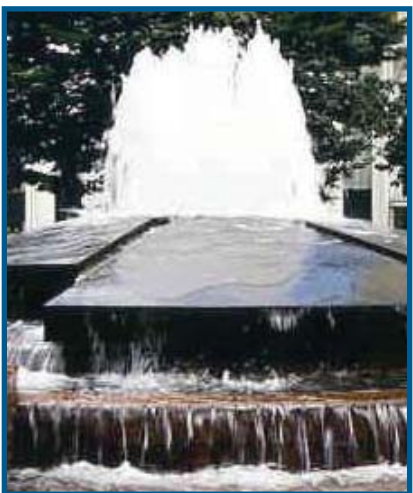

On February 26th, a group of water utilities from all over the nation, announced the formation of the Water Utility Climate Alliance (WUCA).

The impacts of climate change on the United States, particularly in the West, are likely to be significant. Providing leadership in understanding these impacts, adapting our policies, programs and systems to responsibly meet this challenge, and reducing our green house gas emissions are the main ideas behind the formation of WUCA.

Horse Trough Fountain Up and Running

It's not in our decorative fountain quiz, and it's not the subject of this year's limerick fountain, but Portland's **Horse Trough Fountain**, recently got some special attention--it got an early spring cleaning by the folks in Grounds Maintenance.

The Horse Trough Fountain, on the corner of NW 31st & Thurman, was installed sometime in the early 20th century. The fountain was originally intended as a drinking trough for horses. It also has a



bowl at the base, presumably for dogs, and a drinking spigot for humans.

According to Bill Georgeades, Grounds Maintenance Supervisor, the fountain was pressure washed, and the rusty mounting plate for the bowl was replaced. Ageing grout was also removed and replaced.

In 2003, National Geographic did some research on the fountain and found that children had raised money to purchase it, because they felt sorry for the workhorses pulling loads up the hill on Thurman.
